

### Common name

Marsh bush-pea

## **Family**

Fabaceae

# Where found

Freshwater swamps below 800m altitude. Coast and ranges north from just south of Jervis Bay.

#### **Notes**

Shrub to 0.6 m tall or sprawling. Stems densely hairy when young, becoming moderately hairy. Leaves alternating up the stems, 0.6-0.8 cm long, 1-2 mm wide, tips pointed; both surfaces hairless, lower surface with a dark purplish-brown central band, margins flat, rough, warty, with some short hairs when immature. Flowers pea-shaped, with 5 petals, 2 joined together to form the keel, with orange-yellow petals with red markings, calyx 3-4 mm long, grey hairy, standard petal about 6 mm long. Bracteoles immediately below the flowers linear, about 2 mm long, densely hairy. Bracts below the flowers 1.5–3 mm long. Flowers in a dense head of about 6–12 flowers. Flowers Sep.–Oct.
