Common name

Stalked mistletoe, Box mistletoe

Family

Loranthaceae

Where found

Dry forest and woodland. Parasitic on several species of *Eucalyptus* and *Acacia* (particularly *Eucalyptus polyanthemos* and *Eucalyptus melliodora* in the ACT). Widespread.

Notes

Mistletoe, stems to 3m long. Plants attached to the host by a bulbous union. **External runners** absent. Fruit fleshy, sticky. Leaves somewhat fleshy. Young shoots hairy, becoming hairless. Leaves opposite each other or scattered along the stems, 3-40 cm long, 5-30 mm wide, hairless, tips blunt. Flowers 15-35 mm long, red, initially tubular, but the 5-7 **petals** finally free from each other to the base when the flowers are fully open. Flowers in 3-s (triads) or 4-s (tetrads), all flowers stalked, rarely the central flower stalkless. Triads and tetrads in clusters of 3-7. Flowers Summer to Autumn. Ripe fruit yellow to red., oval to pear-shaped, 8–12 mm long.

All native plants on unleased land in the ACT are protected.
