Common name

Alpine bottlebrush

Family

Myrtaceae

Where found

Wet heath, along streams, and in and near swamps, mostly at higher altitudes. Blue Mountains. Widespread south of the Hume Highway but not on the Western Slopes.

Notes

Shrub to 3 m tall, new growth silvery-grey. Leaves often with sharp tips. Bark hard. Stems hairy, becoming hairless. Leaves aromatic when rubbed, alternating up the stems, 1-3.2 cm long, 0.75-2 mm wide, often thick and almost cylindrical, oil glands mostly on the lower surface. Flower spikes 20-70 mm long, 15–22 mm in diameter, creamy white to yellow, sometimes tinged with green or pink. Individual flowers with 5 petals. Flowers mostly Spring to Summer, and sporadically throughout the year.
