

Common name

Franklin Bitter-cress

Family

Brassicaceae

Where found

Subalpine areas. ACT, the mountains to the west, Kosciuszko National Park, and tablelands south of the ACT.

Notes

Erect perennial herb to 0.3 m high, with a taproot. Basal leaves to 15 cm long, **entire** and spoon-shaped or sometimes **compound**, forming a more or less dense **rosette**. Stem leaves 0-3, **alternating** up the stems, 1–5 cm long, compound, becoming smaller in size up the stem. Flowers with 4 **petals** each 4.5–7 mm long, all white, pink, or white inside and pink on the outside. 6 **stamens**. Flowers usually in many-flowered clusters. Flowers spring.

All native plants on unleased land in the ACT are protected.
