## Where found

Woodland, shrubland, and heath. Suburban Sydney, between Colo Heights and Castle Hill

## Notes

Small mallee-like tree to 4.5 m high. Bark thick, somewhat fibrous, furrowed, but loose on the lower trunk and tending to be scaly higher up. Adult leaves alternating up the stems, $4-12 \mathrm{~cm}$ long, $10-42 \mathrm{~mm}$ wide, dark green, glossy, upper and lower surfaces different colours. Flowers white, with 0 petals. Flower clusters $6-8$-flowered. Buds $6-10 \mathrm{~mm}$ long, caps longer or shorter than the base. Gumnuts $5-7 \mathrm{~mm}$ in diameter. Gumnuts that have dropped their seed have protruding valves.

An intergrade between Eucalyptus notabilis and Eucalyptus resinifera
