Plants of South Eastern New South Wales

Common name

A raspwort

Family

Haloragaceae

Where found

Disturbed areas in wet forest. Kosciuszko National Park

Notes

Shrub to 1.2 m high. Stems cylindrical to ridged but not prominently 4-angled, densely covered with fine **spreading** hairs. Leaves opposite each other, **alternating** up the stems on the flowering shoots, 3.5–8.2 cm long, 17–42 mm wide, hairless to sparsely hairy, margins coarsely toothed. Flowers with 4 greenish hooded **petals** each 3.5-4 mm long, and 4 **styles**. Flowers in 3–7-flowered subclusters at the base of small leaves, forming a dense **spike**-like cluster. Seed cases pyramidal to pear shaped, 2–2.8 mm long, 4– ribbed, hairy with short hairs (needs a hand lens or a macro app on your phone/tablet to see).
