
# **Plants of South Eastern New South Wales**

#### Common name

Halo bush-pea

### **Family**

Fabaceae

#### Where found

Dry forest, woodland, and heath. Coast, ranges, and tablelands.

## **Notes**

Shrub, prostrate or to 1 m tall. Bark smooth. Stems sparsely to densely hairy. Leaves alternating up the stems, 0.3-3 cm long, 1-4 mm wide, often concave in cross section, tips blunt, margins often curved down, tips blunt; upper surface hairless, darker than the lower surface, lower surface hairy; midrib prominent. Flowers 6-10 mm long, pea shaped, with 5 petals, 2 joined together to form the keel, standard petal yellow to orange with red markings, wings yellow to red, keel red to purple. Bracteoles boat-shaped to linear, inserted on the calyx tube. Flowers in dense clusters. Flowers most of the year. Pods densely to sparsely hairy, smooth.
