Silvery Inch Plant

Family

Commelinaceae

Where found

Forest, woodland, urban bushland, disturbed sites, roadsides, and near streams. Coastal north of Kiama.

Notes

Introduced creeping perennial herb, rooting at the nodes, flowering tips turning up. Fleshy. Stems hairless, usually tinged purplish-red. Leaves alternating along the stems, 2.5–7 cm long, 15–30 mm wide, upper surface with broad silvery green stripes, lower surface purple, margins fringed, bases with a sheath, tips pointed. Flowers tubular, the tube 5–9 mm long, with 3 pink to purplish lobes, each about 6 mm long. Flowers in small clusters. Flowers mainly spring-summer.
