Common name

Sticky wallaby bush, Pinkwood

Family

Euphorbiaceae

Where found

Rocky places. Coast and ranges. Occasionally on the tablelands and Western Slopes.

Notes

Shrub to 4 m tall. Leaves spirally arranged, 2-5 cm long, 5-15 mm wide, hairless, often sticky, margins flat or slightly curved down, tips pointed. Male and female flowers on separate plants. Flowers green, with 5 '**petals**', male flowers with '**petals**' 2.8–5 mm long, with yellow **anthers**, in clusters of 1-5, female flowers with '**petals**' 2-3 mm long, single. Flowers Winter to Summer. Seed cases sticky, hairless or sparsely hairy, 6–8 mm long.
