Common name

Watershield

Family

Cabombaceae

Where found

In shallow freshwater lagoons or backwaters. Coastal north from east of Moruya.

Notes

Spreading herb, rooting at the **nodes**. Stems, leaf stalks, and the lower surface of the leaves covered with clear mucilage. Leaves **alternating** along the stems, 2.5-9 cm long, 15-60 mm wide, **peltate**, lower surface often red. Leaf stalks to 2 m long, depending on water depth. Flowers dark maroon, purplish or reddish black, with 6-8 '**petals**' each 9–18 mm long. Flowers Oct.–Feb. The flowers rise twice to the surface, firstly to be pollinated, then a day later to release pollen.
