Common name

Small-leaved clematis, Old man's beard, Clematis, Narrow-leaved clematis

Family

Ranunculaceae

Where found

Forest, woodland, rocky areas, and along streams. Tablelands, ACT, the mountains to the west, and Kosciuszko National Park.

Notes

Woody or **perennial** climber to about 5 m high, or trailing. Young stems sparsely hairy, soon becoming hairless. Leaves opposite each other, 5-15 cm long, **compound**, divided into 3's two or three times, or occasionally a few leaves **entire**; **terminal** leaflets 0.2–2.5 cm long, 1–3 mm wide, margins sometimes with 1 or 2 basal lobes but lacking teeth, tips usually blunt, leaf stalks often twining or twisting. Male and female flowers on different plants. Flowers with 4 petal-like **sepals** to 20 mm long, pale yellow or greenish cream to

creamy-white, sometimes with a pinkish blush, in few to many-flowered clusters.

Was Clematis microphylla var. leptophylla.

All native plants on unleased land in the ACT are protected.
