Common name

Mountain cress

Family

Brassicaceae

Where found

Rocky and sandy sites. Kosciuszko National Park, the mountains to the north, ACT, and the tablelands south of the ACT.

Notes

Herb or subshrub, to 0.4 m high, base and **rhizome** woody, plants grey with branched or **stellate** hairs (needs a hand lens or a macro app on your phone/tablet to see). Stems cylindrical or finely **fluted**. Basal leaves in a **rosette**, 1-5.3 cm long, **entire**, toothed, or lobed with 1-4 pairs of lobes. Stem leaves becoming smaller, **alternating** up the stems. Flowers with 4 **petals** each 3.5–6 mm long, white or lavender, often purplish on the back. Flowers spring–summer. Seed cases mostly 0.4–1 cm long (excluding the **beak**), 1-2 mm wide; beak 0.5–1 mm long; stalks 5–11 mm long.

All native plants on unleased land in the ACT are protected.
