Common name

Narrow-leaved willow-herb, Hairy willow-herb

Family

Onagraceae

Where found

Forest, woodland, moist grassy areas, disturbed sites, and swamps. Widespread.

Notes

Perennial herb to 1.4 m tall, often woody near the base. Stems very hairy, sticky in the flowering region. Leaves alternating up the stems, or a few near the base of the plant opposite each other, 1.5-8 cm long, 2-10 mm wide, hairy, greyish at least when young, margins with minute teeth in the upper half of the leaf or only near the rounded tip, and sometimes wavy. Flowers with a floral tube, and 4 purplish pink or white petals each 3-8 mm long. Flowers with a conspicuous ring of long hairs inside the floral tube. Flowers Spring to Summer. Seed cases 3.5–6 cm long, densely hairy, with a mixture of long spreading hairs and short glandular hairs; on stalks 6–15 mm long

Definite identification of *Epilobium* species requires microscopic examination of the seeds.

All native plants on unleased land in the ACT are protected.
