### Common name

Deciduous fig

## **Family**

Moraceae

## Where found

Rainforest and rocky sites. Coast and ranges north from Milton.

#### **Notes**

Tree to 35 m high, with buttresses at the base, more or less **deciduous**. A strangler, first an **epiphyte** on the host tree, and then forming a massive trunk of joined roots around the host tree. Bark grey, smooth. Stems hairless. Leaves **alternating** up the stems, 7–15 cm long, 20–60 mm wide, hairless, relatively thin, tips mostly bluntly pointed, bases slightly **cordate**, leaf stalks sometimes with a joint at the top. Male and female flowers on the same plant. Individual flowers very small, inside the figs. Figs more or less round, 15–25 mm in diameter, yellowish, turning reddish or purple-black, with pale spots. Figs single, ripe January -July.
