Where found

Weed. North from south of Campbelltown.

Notes

Introduced annual herb to 0.4 m high. Stems hairy, the hairs interlacing. Basal leaves in a **rosette**, usually withering before flowering. Stem leaves **alternating** up the stems. Leaves 2–4 cm long, 2–5 mm wide, tips blunt to pointed and **mucronate**, bases slightly stem-clasping, both surfaces white-tomentose. Flower **heads** 2.5–3 mm long, bell-shaped, slightly **cobwebby** at the base. **Florets** 3–5 per flower **head**, usually purple at the top. Bracts tightly surrounding the flower heads with tips sometimes purplishtinged, inner **bracts** usually purple, with whitish tips, tinged with brown. Flower heads initially in uninterrupted, cylindrical **spikes** mostly 3–4 cm long, 8–12 mm wide, usually becoming interrupted in late flowering; with leaflike bracts throughout the flowering time.
