#### Common name

Round-leaved mint-bush, Round-leaf Mint-bush

## **Family**

Lamiaceae

### Where found

Forest and woodland, often in rocky areas. Kosciuszko National Park. Tablelands and ranges south of the Hume Highway. Sometimes elsewhere.

#### **Notes**

Shrub to 3 m high. Branches moderately covered with short curled hairs and almost stalkless glands. The whole plant aromatic. Leaves opposite each other, 0.3–2 cm long, 3–15 mm wide; mid-green, rarely almost silvery, hairless (the midrib often sparsely to moderately hairy), moderately to densely glandular, margins entire or irregularly lobed or scalloped, tips rounded. Flowers purplemauve to purple, sometimes pinkish, with a bell-shaped tube, 10–15 mm long, 2-lipped, 5-lobed. Calyx 2-lobed. Flowers apparently single at the base of paired leaves, or forming short leafless clusters. Flowering: September–November.
