## Common name

A Pseudanthus

### Family

Picrodendraceae

## Where found

Heath and rocky places. Coast, ranges, tablelands, and Western Slopes. Mainly Blue Mountains.

#### Notes

Rigid **shrub**, sprawling to **prostrate**. Stems to 0.2 m long, hairless to rough with minute projections. Leaves **alternating** along the stems or opposite each other, 0.2–0.55 cm long, 1.5–2 mm wide, leathery, margins thickened and **entire**, tips blunt and curved down. Male and female flowers on the same plant. Flowers with 6 '**petals**'. Male flowers pale red, '**petals**' 0.8–1.5 mm long. Female flowers reddish, 'petals' 1.2–1.6 mm long. Flowers single or in clusters. Seed case mottled green and red, oval, smooth, 4–4.5 mm long. Flowering: spring.

Family was Euphorbiaceae.
