## Common name

Wreath bush-pea

## Family

Fabaceae

### Where found

Dry forest, woodland, and heath. Coast, ranges, and the eastern part of the tablelands, north from west of Milton. Rare elsewhere.

#### Notes

Shrub to 2 m tall. Stems sparsely to moderately hairy, the hairs obscured by stipules that lie close to the stems. Leaves occasionally with sharp points, alternating up the stems, 0.3-2.5 cm long, 1.5-8 mm wide, flat to concave in cross section, tips pointed to blunt, rarely with a stiff bristle, margins curved upwards, lower surface darker than upper surface. Flowers 10-16 mm long, pea shaped, with 5 petals, 2 joined together to form the keel, standard petal yellow to red, sometimes with red markings, wings yellow-red, keel yellow-red. Flowers in leafy clusters. Bracteoles silky, boat-shaped or with three teeth at the tips, with beige hairy margins, inserted at the base of the calyx tube. Flowers most of the year. Pods with a tuft of hairs at the tips.

Was Pultenaea sp. H and Pultenaea sp. aff. elliptica.
