## Plants of South Eastern New South Wales

## Common name

Small supplejack

## Family

Ripogonaceae

## Where found

Forest. Coastal north of Wollongong.

## Notes

Climber with stems to about 5 m long, sometimes straggling and shrub-like when young. Stems usually sparsely prickly. Fruit fleshy. Stems hairy to hairless with yellowish to brownish hairs. Leaves opposite each other, often appearing compound, 5-10 cm long, 2540 mm wide, surfaces mostly hairless except for the main veins, tips pointed, bases cordate, stalks $4-7 \mathrm{~mm}$ long, brownish tomentose. Flowers with 6 cream to white 'petals', each $4-5 \mathrm{~mm}$ long, on stalks $2-5 \mathrm{~mm}$ long, in many-flowered clusters. Fruit fleshy, orange-red, round, $8-12 \mathrm{~mm}$ in diameter. Flowering: winter and spring.
